# **Reflection from the Rector**

Richard Curtis, the English film maker, made a film called About Time; it's a fantasy story about a father and son who can go back in time and correct the mistakes they made. Over time in the film, the son realises that he doesn't need to go back, he just needs to live each moment as if it were his last and make good choices as he goes along. Making the good choice as we go along is not always straightforward. Two thousand years ago, the Apostle Paul new this; he pointed out that even though we know what is the right thing to do, sometimes we choose the wrong anyway.

A few thousand years ago people had a more fluid approach to time than we do today. The first reading for the 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday after Trinity is from the prophet Zechariah; he lived at the time when Israel had returned to Jerusalem after years of captivity in Babylon. Zechariah spoke of a time when the king would come to save them in humility, riding on a donkey, and would rebuild the temple of God. At the time of Zechariah, the temple was being rebuilt, but Zechariah was also speaking of a time in the future and of the end time. Zechariah's prophecy took in the whole scope of time present and future.

If we could look at our world in this way and see our lives as part of the eternal; to be aware of God who is eternally present, maybe we would hear that still small voice of calm, the voice of God and discern how to choose the right thing.

Our Gospel reading for the 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday after Trinity paints a picture of Jesus speaking with and listening to the Father and then passing on what he hears to others. Jesus is surrounded by powerful people; there are heated arguments. Those in authority created laws based on the first five books of the Bible and they use these laws to control people. It has been said that there were 613 laws at the time, and people were expected to live in accordance with the laws. These laws were known as the yoke, the kind of yoke that you put around the neck of an ox so that you can control its movements; and people were expected to 'wear' this yoke; that is they were meant to live in obedience to these laws. Jesus saw this yoke as a heavy burden imposed not by God, but by people in authority, and so he said to the people "come to me all you who are weary and carrying heavy burdens and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy and my burden is light".

The yoke of Christ is not a heavy burden; it is easy; a way of knowing God that can be understood by a child or a bishop. Easy, so you can understand in an instant or spend a lifetime and still not fully know. The church offers us space to see our lives as part of this eternal life in God, and knowing this, we may more easily choose to do the right thing.

#### **WORSHIP IN THE CHURCHES**

As the churches are closed for public worship, the Rector, James continues to celebrate the Eucharist in the churches behind closed doors. On the 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday after Trinity, the 5<sup>th</sup> of July, he will celebrate the Eucharist in St Catharine's at 9.30am and in St Ninian's at 11.15am.

### **NO INTERNET ACCESS**

### LISTEN TO THE SCOTTISH EPISCOPAL CHURCH'S SERVICES ON THE TELEPHONE

Below are details of how people can listen to the Scottish Episcopal Church's services on the telephone. If you know people who do not have access to the internet, who may like to hear the services, please let them know. In order to hear a broadcast service by telephone there are some things you need to do.

- 1. Call the free phone line 0800 260 5801. The line will be active from 10.45am before the Sunday service and 6.15pm before the Thursday service.
- 2. Once you have called the number you will be prompted to enter a "meeting ID". The meeting ID numbers appears below: please note that there are two different 'meeting ID' numbers, one for Sunday service and one for Thursday service. Type the relevant number on your telephone keypad, then press the # (hash) key.
- 3. You will then be prompted to enter a participant ID. <u>Simply ignore this request</u>, and once again press the # key.
- 4. You should then hear music, and a sporadic countdown until the start of the service.
- 5. The service will run according to the 1982 liturgy. While you are listening, you will be joining hundreds of others in worship at the same time, although the service is recorded. When participating in the worship, your voice will not be heard by the other participants to ensure that all callers can hear the service clearly.
